Mechanism of Action	Binds to sterols in the fungal cell membrane, changing cell wall permeability and causing leakage of cell contents.
Indications	Indication 1: Treatment of oral candidiasis
	Indication 2: Prophylaxis for all infants <30 weeks
	Indication 3: Prophylaxis for infants 30-32 weeks if colonised with yeast
	Indication 4: Prophylaxis for all infants on prolonged courses of antibiotics >7 days

Comments	When oral suspension is prescribed for ventilated babies it may be helpful to use a cotton swab to apply a proportion of the dose around the mouth and then administer the remainder down the nasogastric tube.
